#### Bulletin boards are coming to our parks!

Each year, the City of Bellingham allocates \$40,000 to fund the Small & Simple Grant program—small amounts of money to be used for simple but substantial improvements. In the past, the York Neighborhood Association (YNA) has utilized Small & Simple funding to complete many projects, ranging from park improvements to historic preservation. The Butterfly Garden at Rock Hill Park, the "Welcome to York" signs on Ellis Street, and many of our annual community events have all been funded through this program. The application guidelines specify a preference for project proposals that "make real, substantial, and positive changes" to the neighborhood, and it is in that spirit that we are proud to announce the City has approved our 2023 selection!

It's hard to miss the freestanding bulletin board outside of **Nelson's Market** at 514 Potter Street, and that's by design. The simple structure is well loved and much utilized by local residents (as evidenced by the hundreds of staples I pulled out of it last weekend) for seeking everything from babysitting to lost pets to garage sales, and beyond. In an increasingly digital age, there is something truly sincere and effective about a handwritten sign that a Facebook post simply cannot compete with, which is why, for our 2023 Small and Simple project, the YNA Board of Directors proposed erecting **additional bulletin boards** in **Rock Hill Park** and **Harriet Spanel Park**. We plan to utilize local labor and materials and will allocate funding for ongoing maintenance.



In future years, we envision converting one side of each bulletin board into a monument sign for the parks, which will detail their histories and further cement the unique sense of place and community that makes York our home. These boards will join the one at Nelson's as places where our children advertise their lemonade stands, where our friends promote small businesses, and where our neighbors connect in a "real, substantial, and positive" way.

The Yorker recently checked in with York resident Jesse Levison over on Franklin Street. She's the owner of Alphabet Studios, a stationery-and-gift company. Jesse's designs are bright, fun, and simply from the heart. I admit I chuckled when I saw the scantron card with the words "You did it!" bubbled in—perfect for graduation!



So, Jesse, why stationery and greeting cards?
That is, what was the spark for this particular form of creativity?

I grew up in Miami and studied photography and printmaking in college at the University of Florida in Gainesville, falling in love with the medium while I was there. I loved the tactile nature of the inks, running paper through industrial presses, and learning how to translate art onto a silk screen.



What brought you to Bellingham?

My husband Alex and I moved here almost two years ago to be closer to accessible nature and smaller-town living than LA. We have a four-year-old and wanted her to grow up in more of an outdoorsy community. It just seemed like a bit of a slower pace of life here.

What are some things you enjoy about the York neighborhood?



As some Yorkers still mourn the loss of Jon Ostby, and breathe a sigh of relief that the new owners of Nelson's,

Ben and Urania Shaklee, will keep the establishment the same great place the York neighborhood has come to love, let us not forget to honor our longtime neighbor and board member Anne Mackie who recently moved from the residence above the market to the Cordata neighborhood, following Jon's passing.

Anne's legacy of activism in York flourished for over 30 years after moving to York (a second time) in 1992, when she purchased a home on Grant Street. She has been instrumental in keeping our city planners on their toes and attuned to the diverse needs of the York community. Of course, she didn't do it alone, and she credits the YNA groups over the years for the wide array of projects that have been completed during her tenure.

Having taken over as the *Yorker* editor when Anne passed the torch last year, I was moved by her recent admission of pride that "York has maintained its newsletter since 1977, and I had a hand in carrying the tradition on from others when I came in 1992. Communication and outreach to all neighbors was always a number one priority of the board. We also committed to being inclusionary of all neighbors and especially wanted our temporary rental neighbors to feel they belong."

As an at-large member of the board, I can say that we are still honoring these commitments. I'm confident Anne will continue to be active in any community she is a part of and we wish her the very best in her new home. **We THANK YOU, ANNE**, for all you have done over the decades, and we will continue to be a force in the preservation and shaping of our future York neighborhood.

When I asked Anne what she felt most satisfied about having accomplished, she replied, "It's hard to pick one thing; but I am fortunate to have partnered with my husband Jon Ostby to keep the dream alive at the corner of Potter and Humboldt Streets for so many years as Nelson's Market. Someone once wrote, 'The best neighborhoods are distinguished by more than an address or location. The best neighborhoods are defined by a caring community spirit.' That spirit is what I hope carries on in York."

#### Digging through the archives




