Summer's last shout—York's Annual Picnic!


The York Neighborhood Association hosted a wonderful event in **Harriet Spanel Park** on September 10! The feedback received during and after the event was very positive.

- The annual piñata got demolished to the tune of 120 pieces of candy for the kids, and 10 kids participated in the talent show at the end of the picnic.








Urban Forestry Management Plan update

The City of Bellingham continues to make progress on the development of its first Urban Forestry Management Plan (UFMP) and is in Phase 3 (Plan Development), the process of preparing a draft using the community input they received in Phase 2. There will be opportunities for community feedback on the draft plan before it is finalized. City staff presented a project status update to City Council during the Committee of the Whole meeting on September 25.

Currently, about 35% of Bellingham's area has a tree canopy—pretty good as compared to, say, Seattle's 28% or Abbotsford's 22%. In preparation for developing the Plan, Planning Department and its team of consultants evaluated three possible canopy-cover targets: Status Quo (35%), No Net Loss (40%), and Growth (45%). The canopy-cover target will guide and inform which actions are included in the Plan.

Department staff presented an update to City Council on Monday, November 20th, at the Public Works and Natural Resources Committee meeting. In preparation for developing the Plan, they evaluated three possible canopy-cover targets: Status Quo (35%), No Net Loss (40%), and Growth (45%), and they recommended the 40% approach. Following the staff presentation and further City Council discussion at the evening meeting, however, the Council directed the Planning Department to develop a draft plan using the 45% (Growth) canopy cover target.







Assumptions of the Growth target were:

- Doubling private and public urban land planting (~10,000 trees/year)
- Same habitat restoration/mitigation
- · Highest landscaping requirements
- Trees taller than 8 inches protected/replaced
- Complete assumption of City street tree maintenance
- Tree-planting incentive program

Brace yourself for bridge closures

Just when you thought Meador Avenue was driveable again after this autumn's Cascade Natural Gas (CNG) project...the City plans to begin construction on its project to replace the **Meador Avenue and James Street bridges** in early 2024. Both bridges were originally built in 1936 and rebuilt in 1962 and are now due for replacement. During construction, there will be at least one bridge open at any given time to minimize traffic disruptions.

Changes coming to York's parks

Find yourself curious as to the concrete laid in our two neighborhood parks this autumn? Wonder no more! Those foundations are the beginnings of our new kiosks constructed by the Bellingham Parks Department and supported by a Small & Simple Grant. The kiosks will be open to communicate messages and provide a safe meeting location for community members. Once the kiosks are complete, the next phase will add a park description and history.

As reported in previous editions of the *Yorker*, **Rock Hill Park** is scheduled for a renovation in early 2024. The Parks Department intends to start detailed planning and design work in the new year, and the York Neighborhood Association (YNA) will provide opportunities for input and feedback. Following recent visits by Parks officials, focus areas will include activation of the top portion, wayfinding paths to encourage healthy walking traffic, improved accessibility, and a new playground. YNA Board members **Kevin Cussen** and **Colin Beazley** will oversee the Rock Hill Park Renovation Committee, and we welcome your participation and input.

Focus on York business: Five Columns

York residents may be reading this with a little confusion:

Five Columns is a Sehome restaurant, isn't it? Actually, it's not; our little neighborhood is largely residential but is home to around 100 storefront businesses, and Five Columns is one of our only three dining establishments.



It's Sehome-facing in their location at 1301 East Maple Street and probably has more clientele from that direction, but it's in York...and it's a longtime staple of both neighborhoods—and beyond, with regulars coming from Canada and Anacortes as well as other Bellingham neighborhoods.

It's been here a long time, too, originally as a steakhouse called **Rib** 'n' Reef run by **Dimitri** (Jim) and Argedini (Dini) Christopoulos since 1987.

Both are from small villages in the Peloponnese region of Greece but came to Bellingham via Montréal, where their daughters **Soula** and **Niki** were born. The family still runs the business, and part-owner **Soula** Christopoulos was happy to answer our questions on behalf of their York neighbors.



Five Columns was originally just a traditional steakhouse; as guests got to know the restaurant and its staff, they started requesting Greek dishes, and the menu evolved into what it is today: a Greek steakhouse. As a result, their offerings range from baby back ribs from the old days to souvlakia (Soula herself loves their prawn souvlakia). On Sundays, the kitchen gladly serves their breakfast crowd Eggs Benedict; Soula suggests "if you're feeling adventurous, make sure to try it with the gyro meat instead of the ham."



As for the Five Columns name, well, it's not mythologically or culturally rooted: when the restaurant was being remodeled in the early 2000s, five bright-white columns were installed as part of the architecture. The Christopoulos family then hit on the idea of renaming the business to refer to those columns with a nod to their ample Greek heritage.

Regardless of whether you think of Five Columns as being a Sehome or a York restaurant, Soula says, "one of the biggest compliments we can receive, besides our guests enjoying our food, is when they tell us it's like coming home walking through the doors. And the best part is, you can leave the cooking and cleaning to us." For a taste of their roots, you can also purchase wine from Dimitri's home region there.
